Dear 920th Rescue Wing,

Welcome to the March UTA! I hope this newsletter reaches you and you are doing well. I want to start by expressing my sincere pride and admiration for all you do for our Air Force, our wing, and our rescue mission every day! Thank you, I am grateful to have the opportunity to serve as your commander. I am also extremely grateful to have such incredible leadership throughout the entire wing at Davis Monthan, Portland, Langley, and Patrick! Officer and enlisted leaders that we have are the best I've ever had the honor to serve with, and I appreciate you all. Keep doing what you're doing, and don't wait for me... I'll catch up to your lead eventually!

That said, my role is to support our squadron leadership teams by providing the resources you need to organize, train, and equip to be ready to accomplish your missions. Right now we are going through a tough time with lack of training funds. These Reserve Appropriated funds (RPA funds) are a small part of the overall HQ AFRC portfolio but are absolutely vital to AFRC wings in order to ensure readiness and compliance requirements are achieved. It's my job to get us the budgets we need and distribute them to the squadrons. I want to assure you that myself, my boss Maj Gen Miller (10th AF Commander), and Maj Gen Lewis (AFRC Deputy Commander) are working to get us the resources you all need to be ready. While this year we are gaining AGR positions in some areas and bonuses in others, it will be another 1 or 2 years before they are all filled and our RPA demand will normalize. Meanwhile, many units are trying to accomplish their missions with part-timers and overages filling in for our vacant full-time positions. Our RPA funding is critical, and I will do everything in my power to secure it for our squadrons before the start of the 3rd quarter. Your order from me: keep the faith. I realize the most important assets are time and availability of our reservists. We need to secure availability and then optimize the training and utilization of that time when TRs are on RPA orders. I do not want to break faith with our reservists because we are unable to fund what we've asked them to commit to with their availability, and I realize that has already started due to lack of proper budget distribution. The wing is completely obligated and executed and I am diligently working to get more funds. More to follow, I'll get word out through your leadership teams and update you on status of funds as it comes in.

Now for the good... and bitter sweet news. Last UTA I had the honor to say goodbye to a phenomenal Command Chief, CMSgt Douglas Isaacks. I presided over his retirement ceremony, which was awe-some. The attendance blew me away! Current members from every GSU and alumni from his decorated past came to Patrick to say "thank you" for his service and wish him and his family all the best for the next chapter in their lives. It was bitter sweet in that we lost a great teammate, but we are so proud and happy for Chief Isaacks at the same time. But, we have now gained a new acting Command Chief: CMS-gt Shane Smith will be taking the reigns as the 920th Rescue Wing Command Chief until the formal selection is confirmed and announced. CONGRATULATIONS CMSgt Smith!

Again, I am always in awe of your ability to accomplish our missions and in the pride you all take in what you do as Citizen-Airmen! That is why we were selected as the best wing in AFRC last year and we continue to prove that we are every day. Have a great, safe, and productive March UTA!

## **Tuskegee Airman Properly Laid to Rest**

PATRICK AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. -- In an unmarked grave 20 miles north of Patrick Air Force Base, Florida, lay the remains of a Tuskegee Airman. Despite his legacy, he was buried in 2009 without proper military honors.

Thanks to the help of local veteran groups, family and members of the Patrick AFB Honor Guard, Flight Officer Edwin Cowan was given full military honors for his service, Feb. 7, 2019, at Cape Canaveral National Cemetery, Fla

Cowan served as a Tuskegee Airman during World War II. More than 200 people gathered to witness Cowan and his wife's reburial.

Senior Airman Dylan Aubrey, a relocation and retention technician from the 45th Force Support Squadron was one of the ceremonial guardsmen who participated in the reburial.

"It was a humbling experience," Aubrey said. "As ceremonial guardsmen, we are honored in the closing of a servicemember's military chapter for families and loved ones."

Nearly 100 veteran motorcycle riders showed their support for Cowan and a few fellow Tuskegee Airmen were present.


Cowan's remains were carried in a horse-drawn caisson while ceremonial guardsmen marched behind. The playing of taps was performed by one of Cowan's great-grandsons, after the guardsmen folded the American flag and performed a rifle volley.

Technical Sgt. Grace Lugo, a ceremonial guardsman who is also assigned to the 920th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, said being selected to represent a Tuskegee Airman's sacrifice is an honor.

"Ensuring our fallen are properly laid to rest with military honors is our mission," Lugo added. "I'm grateful to have been a part of the reburial."

The Patrick AFB Honor Guard team is made up of both active duty and reserve Airmen who provide military funeral honors throughout 11 counties in Florida, to servicemembers who were in the Air Force, Army Air Force and Army Air Corps.

The reburial ceremony ended with a flyover performed by two Air Force T-38 Talons.

Specifically, the course focuses on NCO core competencies such as; employing military capabilities, individual readiness, managing organizations and resources, strategic thinking, leading people, effective communications, and embodying airman culture. Students also receive assistance with improving their bullet writing skills for EPRs, ACA, and awards & decorations.

White went on to say that the knowledgeable, high-energy, motivating, "re-bluing" expert instructors, Senior Master Sgt. Brandon De Los Reyes, 67th Aerial Port Squadron, and Master Sgt. Bonnitha Sweet, U.S. Air Force Academy, made a fantastic impression on junior NCO's and were a pleasure to assist.

Chief Master Sgt. Jeremy Buck, 920th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, presented the introduction portion of the course, Chief Master Sgt. Shane Smith, 920th Operations Group, presented the Leadership Scenario's portion and Chief Master Sgt. Christopher Lais, 308th Rescue Squadron, presented the NCOLDC Graduation.
